# WANT TO LEARN TO FLY FISH OR KNOW SOMEONE THAT DOES?

As a part of the Jenks Community Education program members of the Dave Whitlock Chapter of Trout Unlimited will be holding a "Learn to Fly Fish Oklahoma Clinic" on Saturday, October 26th from 9:00am to 2:00pm.

The one-day clinic attempts to answer the many questions and mysteries about the sport of fly fishing as well as the where and how to catch fish using a fly rod. Participants will learn about the equipment, fly fishing terminology, knots, fly tying as well as the basics of casting using a fly rod and reel. All equipment is supplied, however if a participant has their own fly rod, they are encouraged to bring it to learn casting skills with their own fly rod and reel.

Weather is not an issue as the clinic is held indoors at the Jenks High School's Aquatics Center swimming pool on the Jenks Trojan High School campus. The morning session begins at 9:00am in a classroom setting and lasts until noon. After a quick 30-minute break for a sack-lunch or snack the 2<sup>nd</sup> portion begins with knot tying, fly tying and the "hands on" casting clinic. This portion is held on the water in the swimming pool arena.

Advanced registration is required, and the cost of the clinic is \$30.00. The class is limited to 25 and participants must be 15 years of age or older. Sign up on-line at: or by calling the Jenks Community Education office at 918-298-0340.

New features include the patented Tippet Whippet recessed docking station with tippet bar included for instant, fixed, and fumble-free access for up to six spools.

"Main compartment has zippered security pocket with key fob and stretch mesh pockets for small sort storage. Front drop-down has zippered pocket with elastic mesh slip pockets. Lo-pro zinger/nipper pass-through, easy swing handle, and water bottle holder with retainer. Front strap "dashboard" offers multiple docking stations for forceps and small tools as well as sliding adjustment for sternum strap. Left shoulder design frees up casting arm and shoulder."

The Sling Pack is valued at around \$100.

A careful reading of the description reveals that it was designed to go over your "left" shoulder.

# **LIR Safety Tips**

Gore Police Department: 918-489-5963 or 911

Local Game Wardens - 918-431-2550 or 918-431-2544

(to report fishing/hunting violations)

Gore response time is approximately 5 minutes.

If cardiac, call for help, start hands only CPR, pushing downward 2 inches on center of chest to the beat of "Staying Alive" by the Bee Gee's. If possible, please note time when CPR is initiated. Landmarks to assist emergency response: The Dam, Lower parking lot, Watts, and MarVal's. Also, let them know which side of the river you're on. Accurate information will allow for quicker response time.

If it is a swift water rescue, call 911, or Gore Police Dept, and they will respond in addition to Sequoyah County team.

If a medical transfer is needed, they will LifeFlight from the baseball field in Gore to either Muskogee or Sallisaw hospital.

Always a good idea to carry baby aspirin and Benadryl in your fishing gear. Also, a first aid kit in your vehicle shows that you think ahead.

Let's help keep our fellow angler's safe.
